## YEAR-ON-YEAR PRICE SITUATION

## CPI increases by 4.1 percent

The price data in December 2012 reflected a general upward movement, particularly in the cost of consumer goods and services throughout the province. The consumer price index (CPI) in Aklan was placed at 133.0 in December 2012, from 127.8 of the same period a year ago, or an increase of 4.1 percent.

The highest percent change in CPI was noted in Food and Non-Alcoholic Beverages by 5.7 percent (from 134.2 to 141.8 ), followed by Alcoholic Beverages and Tobacco by 3.1 percent mark (from 123.7 to 127.5), and Nonfood items by 2.7 percent (from 122.5 to 125.8).

## CPI by Commodity Group

Among the commodity groups, Education has the highest index with 149.4 or an increase of 0.7 percent from last year's index of 148.4. This was followed by Health with 145.1 index points and Food and NonAlcoholic Beverages with 141.8 mark. On the other hand, Communication has the lowest index this month with 84.8 percent.

## Inflation rate decreases by 0.2 percent

Figure 2 shows that the inflation rate of Aklan for the month of December went down to 4.1 percent or a decrease by 0.2 percent mark compared to the same period of last year's figure of 4.3. From December 2011 to December 2012, the average inflation rate registered at 3.6 percent. During the period specified, October 2012 was noted with highest inflation rate of 4.7 percent, while the month of March 2012 registered the lowest IR in the province.


## MONTH-ON-MONTH PRICE SITUATION

This month, the CPI for all income households in Aklan decreased by 0.08 percent after posting a 133.0 index point over last month's index of 133.1

From November to December 2012, HWEG and Other Fuels registered the highest percent change of 1.86 (from 128.7 to 131.1), followed by Furnishings, Household Equipment and Routine Maintenance of the House with 0.99 (from 120.7 to 121.9), and Restaurants and Miscellaneous Goods and Services with 0.26 (from 116.3 to 116.6). A slight increase was also noted in Health with 0.14 (from 144.9 to 145.1), and Recreation and Culture with 0.09 (from 108.7 to 108.8). Commodities that showed negative percent change this month are: Food and Non-Alcoholic Beverages (-0.98), Alcoholic Beverages and Tobacco (-0.16), Clothing and Footwear ( -0.15 ), and Transport ( -0.08 ). Price of Communication remained stable this month.

## Inflation rate by commodity group

Among the commodity group, Food and Non-Alcoholic Beverages posted a highest inflation rate of 5.7 percent. This is followed by HWEG and Other Fuels, as well as Clothing and Footwear with 3.8 percent, respectively, Household Equipment and Routine Maintenance of the House with 3.7 percent, and Alcoholic Beverages with 3.1 percentage mark. The rest of the commodities have an IR of 2.9 percent and below.


The decrease of price index across Food and Non-Alcoholic Beverages is attributed to the decrease observed in Sugar and other related products (-4.37), Food products NEC (-2.79), Vegetables (-2.52), Corn (2.40), Rice ( -2.08 ), Bread and Cereals ( -1.74 ), Fish ( -0.71 ), and Meat ( -0.50 ). On the other hand, price increase was noted in Milk, Cheese and Eggs (1.30), Fruit (0.62), Non-alcoholic beverages (0.51), and Oils and Fats (0.38).

Non-food items increased by 0.80 percent as a result of significant increase in HWEG and Other Fuels.

## The purchasing power of peso

The purchasing power of peso in Aklan in December 2012 was pegged at 0.75 . This value remained constant over the last four successive months. This means that one peso (P1.00) in 2006 is worth seventy five (P0.75) centavos in December 2012. Interpreted in another way, this means that the same basket of goods and services worth P75.00 in 2006 can be bought at P100.00 in December 2012.

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## Explanatory Notes

Consumer Price Index (CPI) - is an indicator of the change in the average retail prices of a fixed basket of goods and services commonly purchased by the households relative to a base year. It shows how much on the average, prices of goods and services have increased or decreased from a particular reference period.

The December 2012 CPI Report was derived from the results of the 2006-based CPI survey comprised of eleven (11) major commodity groups. These are the following: Food and Nonalcoholic Beverages; Alcoholic Beverages and Tobacco; Clothing and Footwear; Housing, Water, Electricity, Gas and Other Fuels; Furnishings, Household Equipment and Routine Maintenance of the House; Health; Transport; Communication; Recreation and Culture; Education; Restaurants and Miscellaneous Goods and Services.

Inflation rate is defined as the annual rate of change or the year-on-year change in the CPI.
Purchasing power of peso is a measure of the real value of the peso in a given period relative to a chosen reference period.

Market basket is a term used to refer to a sample of goods and services that are commonly purchased and bought by an average Filipino household.

Base period or Base Year is the period, usually a year, at which the index number is set to 100. It is the reference point of the index number series. In this report, 2006 is used as the base period.
